Even though it was a rainy day, we enjoyed visiting the holy site, praying rosary, and celebrating an outdoor mass together. On Sunday, Oct. 15th, our parish offered a talk to parents on anti-bullying and another talk to all on the Creed and we commissioned 14 new Altar Servers at our family mass. Thanks to all participants and helpers, and congratulations to our new servers.







World Mission Sunday

Pope Francis in his message for this year's world mission states that this day invites us to reflect anew on the mission at the heart of the Christian faith. He wrote:

The Church is missionary by nature; otherwise, she would no longer be the Church of Christ, but one group among many others that soon end up serving their purpose and passing away. So it is important to ask ourselves certain questions about our Christian identity and our responsibility as believers in a world marked by confusion, disappointment and frustration, and torn by numerous fratricidal wars that unjustly target the innocent.

. . .

Mission reminds the Church that she is not an end unto herself, but a humble instrument and mediation of the Kingdom. A self-referential Church, one content with earthly success, is not the Church of Christ, his crucified and glorious Body. That is why we should prefer "a Church which is bruised, hurting and dirty because it has been out on the streets, rather than a Church which is unhealthy from being confined and from clinging to its own security."

Pope Francis constantly challenges us to be missionary disciples. "Every Christian is a missionary to the content that he or she has encountered the love of God in Christ Jesus: we no longer say that we are 'disciples' and 'missionary,' but rather that we are missionary disciples." As missionary disciples, our call is not only for the salvation of our own souls, but others. There is a sense of urgency for us to proclaim the Good News and to teach others about the Kingdom, and to baptize all nations in His name.

So on this World Mission Sunday, let us pray for the universal Church; let us learn more about the current missionary outreach programs in our parish and diocese; let us be generous to donate to the World Mission Sunday collection.



Respect Life Corner

The following are entries from the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* that make clear the basis for Respect Life and what is counter to natural and moral law and God's love for humanity. It is our responsibility as Catholics to uphold this commandment and establish a culture of life that is filled with God's mercy and love for His creation and our love for our fellow human being.

470. What is forbidden by the fifth commandment?

The fifth commandment forbids as gravely contrary to the moral law:

- direct and intentional murder and cooperation in it;
- *direct abortion*, willed as an end or as means, as well as cooperation in it. Attached to this sin is the penalty of excommunication because, from the moment of his or her conception, the human being must be absolutely respected and protected in his integrity;
- *direct euthanasia* which consists in putting an end to the life of the handicapped, the sick, or those near death by an act or by the omission of a required action;
- *suicide* and voluntary cooperation in it, insofar as it is a grave offense against the just love of God, of self, and of neighbor. One's responsibility may be aggravated by the scandal given; one who is psychologically disturbed or is experiencing grave fear may have diminished responsibility.

471. What medical procedures are permitted when death is considered imminent?

When death is considered imminent the ordinary care owed to a sick person cannot be legitimately interrupted. However, it is legitimate to use pain-killers which do not aim at in death and to refuse "over-zealous treatment", that is the utilization of disproportionate medical procedures without reasonable hope of a positive outcome.

"GOD IN OUR LIVES" ~Sister Caritas

As children, we have a very clear idea of what belongs to me and what belongs to you. Everything is very "black and white.' One of the most important lessons we learn is to share. If it belongs to us we do not want anyone to take it. This is our childish mind. In some cases, we look at having, as a way of survival. Our materialistic society emphasizes having, accumulating, and acquiring. A very young child learns the word "mine" before they learn many other words.

In the first reading today, God is telling us that even when we did not know God, God was still protecting us, walking with us and caring for us. He tells us there is only one God. God is the true and only God. God should have the first place in our lives. We start out very determined to put God first. Little by little work, fun, earning money, taking care of material things, becomes more important than God. These things take over our decision process and absorb our time so we cannot go to Church, we do not pray. We almost forget that there is a God. God stays with us. We do not stay with God.

In the Gospel today Jesus gives us another point about God to consider. "Give to God what belongs to God." What belongs to God? If we stop and think about it, everything belongs to God. God made all of creation. God made us. He knows us better than we know ourselves. Our talents and gifts are all that God gave us. Our breath, our lives, God gives us. Our family, friends, leaders, doctors, helpers, children and grandchildren- God has given us. Our very body and our very selves, God has given us. In a sense, all things belong to God. God gives us things, people to be with, talents and gifts are given to develop and share. All the good in our lives comes from God. We give it back to Him by the way we use it and by the way we share what we have been given. How do we give to others? It is interesting that the more we give, with a right attitude, the more God gives to us. So today we are reminded to give to God what belongs to God, including our time, talents, and our very selves. We are also reminded to remember God is God. We are called to put God first in our lives. Look at your life, actions and attitudes, and see where you stand with these two things. Then, change what you need to change. God is never outdone in generosity...


