DECREE

IN THE NAME OF GOD. AMEN.

"Likewise, parishes which are too small should be united insofar as the situation demands it and circumstances permit." St. Paul VI, Apostolic Letter *motu proprio, Ecclesiae Sanctae*, n. 21, (1), August 6, 1966

Changing demographics have affected the size and wealth of the Archdiocese of Chicago and the vitality of her parishes. This is particularly true in the City of Chicago itself, where the total population has decreased by nearly 20% since 1970, from 3,388,957 to an estimated 2,736,000 today. The archdiocese has many vacant old and underused parochial buildings and fewer priests to pastor our faith communities.

According to the US Census Bureau, the Archdiocese of Chicago had an estimated total population of 5,914,783 in 2018. The 2018 *Annuario Pontificio* indicates Chicago had 345 parishes serving a Catholic population of 2,512,000. In 2018 the Archdiocese of Los Angeles had a total population of 11,519,517, with 267 parishes for a Catholic population of 4,362,000, more than twice the number of Catholics per parish than Chicago. In the same year the Archdiocese of New York had 2,656,987 Catholics in 294 parishes, also a much larger parishioners per parish number than in Chicago. A good number of our parishes were founded in the first half of the last century or earlier. Many were established for national, linguistic, or ethnic groups that no longer live in the archdiocese or in the neighborhoods where they once flourished.

Too many of our parishes have been unable to support themselves and are receiving financial subsidies from the archdiocese. Between fiscal year 2012 and fiscal year 2018 these subsidies amounted to \$144,373,481.00, including \$38,171,840.00 to 106 parishes, and \$106,201,621.00 to 83 Catholic schools. More than \$25,000,000.00 was given in the last two fiscal years alone. None of this money will be recovered by the archdiocese. The Archdiocese of Chicago cannot continue this level of financial support for parishes and Catholic schools. Our hope is that our parishes will become more vital, that is, active centers of Christian discipleship, evangelical mission, scholarship, and charitable outreach. To achieve this hope, the parishes must be able to support themselves when possible.

More than three years ago, inspired by the experience of St. Francis of Assisi before the cross of the ruined church of San Damiano, and by the Holy Father's dream of "a missionary option ... capable of transforming everything" (Pope Francis, Apostolic Exhortation *Evangelii Gaudium*, n. 27, November 24, 2013), I announced the inauguration of *Renew My Church*

(RMC), a multi-year, intentional process aimed at obtaining and preserving the vitality of our parishes. It is my intention that every parish of the Archdiocese of Chicago join with some of its neighbors and plan together for the future.



Decree - April 8, 2019

Careful planning will create a menu of possible options for future vitality. We will also identify parishes likely to be restructured through pastoral coordination, unions, and other significant alterations. This decree arises out of the work of the eight parishes, all located within a territory of less than five square miles in the Bridgeport-Chinatown-Canaryville neighborhoods of Chicago's Southside. The decree is applicable to St. Barbara Parish (personal parish for Polish-speaking Catholics established 1909-1010, given territorial status in the 1960s), 2859 South Throop Street, Chicago, Illinois 60608, and St. Therese Chinese Catholic Parish, also Archdiocesan Center for the Chinese Apostolate (mission for Chinese-speaking Catholics established 1947, located at the former Santa Maria Incoronata Church since 1963), 218 West Alexander Street, Chicago, Illinois 60616.

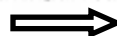
In early 2018 the pastoral leadership and lay representatives from the above-mentioned parishes and mission met in the *RMC* grouping to consider their future. The Grouping Team presented a Community Engagement and Planning Feedback Summary dated May 1, 2018, to the Archdiocesan Standards and Recommendations Commission, a group of lay and ordained representatives from across the archdiocese (see Submission of May 1, 2018, attached to this Decree).

The recommendation of the Commission was conveyed to the Presbyteral Council of the Archdiocese of Chicago first on November 26, 2018. Because clarity could not be achieved for all the recommendations, they were again presented to the Council on January 15, 2019, and March 5, 2019. Ultimately, the recommendations pertaining to this decree provided for the union of St. Barbara Parish with St. Therese Chinese Catholic Parish in one new territorial parish, made possible, in part, through the taking of some territory from the adjacent St. James Parish (see Letter of the Reverend John Edmunds, ST, dated February 28, 2019). The union would be effective from July 1, 2019. The union of the parishes is supported by the data and arguments attached to this decree. Significant is that neither the two parishes combined, nor either of them alone, meets two important recommended minimum levels needed for parish vitality in the archdiocese, namely, at least 800 worshipping parishioners and \$750,000.00 annual operating revenue. Both parishes posted operating deficits in the last two years.

THEREFORE, know that I, Cardinal Blase J. Cupich, Archbishop of Chicago, according to the norms of canons 50-51, canon 127 §§1 & 3, canon 166, and canon 515 §2 of the Code of Canon Law, having before me the recommendations of the Grouping Team and those of the Archdiocesan Standards and Recommendations Commission, convened the Presbyteral Council of the Archdiocese of Chicago on both November 26, 2018, and January 15, 2019, at Our Lady of Hope Parish, Rosemont, Illinois. There, I heard the Presbyteral Council, noted the Council's deliberations, and witnessed the Council's vote. Thereafter, the territorial boundaries of the new parish were discussed and confirmed at the March 5, 2019, meeting of the same Presbyteral Council at St. John of the Cross Parish, Western Springs, Illinois. Consequently, after invoking the Holy Spirit, I

decree the following:

1. Effective July 1, 2019, St. Barbara Parish and St. Therese Chinese Catholic Parish, both on Chicago's Southside, will be extinguished as separate juridic persons in the Church and united to form a single new juridic person, a territorial parish known, *ad interim*, as SS. Barbara and Therese Parish;
2. The Archdiocesan Center for the Chinese Apostolate of the extinguished St. Therese Chinese Catholic Parish will be a pastoral responsibility of the newly established parish, and the other ministries of the two extinguished parishes will be subsumed into the work of the newly established SS. Barbara and Therese Parish;
3. Each and all the parishioners of the two parishes to be extinguished will be fully and equally parishioners of the new SS. Barbara and Therese Parish;



4. The territory of the new SS. Barbara and Therese Parish will be the territory of St. Barbara Parish combined with territory taken from the adjacent St. James Parish, namely the territory located within these boundaries:

Start at the east bank of the South Branch of the Chicago River and 18th Street,
East on the south side of 18th Street to Metra Rock Island R.R. Line,
South on the west side of Metra Rock Island R.R. Line to extension of 27th Street (as it runs west of the Dan Ryan Expressway),
West on the north side of extension of 27th Street to the Dan Ryan Expressway,
West on the center line of Dan Ryan Expressway to the Stevenson Expressway,
West on the center line of Stevenson Expressway to Halsted Street,
South on the west side of Halsted Street to 31st Street,
West on the north side of 31st Street and extension of 31st Street to the South Branch of the Chicago River (Bubbly Creek),
North and east along the south side of South Branch of the Chicago River to 18th Street.

5. The churches of the extinguished St. Barbara Parish and the extinguished St. Therese Chinese Catholic Parish will remain open as parochial churches of the new SS. Barbara and Therese Parish, retaining their own titles;

6. Subject to the intention of founders and donors, and with due regard for any acquired rights, the goods and patrimonial rights of the extinguished St. Barbara Parish and the extinguished St. Therese Chinese Catholic Parish, together with any obligations with which they may be burdened, will become those of the newly established SS. Barbara and Therese Parish (see canon 121);

7. The documents given to the Presbyteral Council on this matter, together with the minutes of the Council meetings of November 26, 2018, January 15, 2019, and March 5, 2019, will be attached to this decree;

8. In due course, the sacramental records and other materials relevant to historical research concerning the extinguished St. Barbara Parish and the extinguished St. Therese Chinese Catholic Parish will be commended to the Joseph Cardinal Bernardin Archives and Records Center of the Archdiocese of Chicago for safe keeping and suitable access; and

9. Notification of this decree will be given immediately to the pastoral leadership of St. Barbara Parish and St. Therese Chinese Catholic Parish, both on the Southside of the City of Chicago, and to their parishioners. Publication will be made through the parish bulletins, and generally on the archdiocesan website.

Before hierarchical recourse [appeal] may be taken against this decree, a petition to reconsider or amend the decree must be delivered to me at my office within ten (10) useful days from notification of the decree (CIC cc. 1734, 1735, 1737).

Have Hope, Because ‘God Doesn’t Lose’

Recent address of the Archbishop of Philadelphia to seminarians at the Pontifical College Josephinum in Columbus, Ohio - Catholics are called to renew the Church through lives of holiness, humility, and love.

“All of the great Catholic reformers in history had three essential qualities: personal humility; a passion for purifying the Church starting with themselves; and a fidelity to her teaching, all motivated by unselfish, self-sacrificing love.”

“God calls all of us, but especially his priests, not just to renew the face of the earth with his Spirit, but to renew the heart of the Church with our lives; to make her young and beautiful, again and again, so that she shines with his love for the world. That’s our task. That’s our calling. That’s what a vocation is – a calling from God with our name on it.”

“To borrow from St. Augustine, God made us to make the times, not the times to make us. We’re the subjects of history, not its objects. And unless we make the times better with the light of Jesus Christ, then the times will make us worse with their darkness,” Chaput added.

“We’re simply back again in the night before the Resurrection. The night passes. And we already know how the story ends; we just need to imprint it on our hearts.”

“Twenty centuries after the resurrection of Jesus, the Church continues her mission. She survives and continues through the grace of God. But that grace works through people like you and me,” he said.

“Do we really believe in Jesus Christ or not? That’s the central question in our lives. Everything turns on the answer. Because if our Christian faith really grounds and organizes our lives, then we have no reason to fear, and we have every reason to hope.”

“Hope depends on faith. It can’t survive without a foundation of passionate belief in something or Someone higher and greater than ourselves. Without faith, ‘hope’ is just another word for the cheap and cheesy optimism the modern world uses to paper over its own – and our own – brokenness.”

“But God is here with us, and because he is, this time of ours, like every other difficult time in history, is a good time to be a Catholic and especially to be a priest -- because every priest has the privilege of holding the Source of love, the God who made all creation, in his hands.”

The archbishop added that as the Church becomes absent “from the center of today’s Western culture,” Catholics are becoming disoriented, and many are “leaving the pews.”

“This ongoing cultural realignment will shake many of our Church institutions, from urban parishes, to schools, universities, hospitals, and other agencies – even seminaries. They were founded in a different era in accord with social and political conditions that no longer exist. But for committed believers it’s an exhilarating time, too, because we’re being pushed back onto the foundations of our faith, the enduring sources of truth and life.”

“We still need budgets, and we can’t escape meetings. The Church was instituted by Christ, which means she’s an institution, a living body of the faithful ordered toward worship of God and service in the world. But in this time of sifting, a great deal of dead weight is being stripped away. We’re being driven closer to the one, simple truth from which the Church draws her purpose and strength: God incarnate in Christ, the author of our salvation and life eternal,” he said.

As he concluded, Chaput encouraged faith amid difficulty.

“The gift of this moment, the blessing of our disestablishment, is that we’re being exposed to the world as followers of Jesus Christ, even as we stumble and fall. And through the witness of the faithful who trust, and serve, and endure in his love -- despite all our failures and weaknesses -- God will make the Gospel new and more radiant. History is a record of that story again and again. God doesn’t lose.”

"Sacred Mysteries" by Sister Caritas
